### "Dwight, Illinois: Where Big League Talent Met Small Town America"

With baseball season in full swing, enjoy an evening with Bill Pearch, a Society for American Baseball Research (SABR) member and Dwight High School graduate (1991), as he discusses Dwight, Illinois' unique connection to our national pastime. His presentation, *Dwight, Illinois: Where Big League Talent Met Small Town America*, will highlight our community's earliest references to baseball, how Col. Frank L. Smith's namesake team aided his political aspirations, and several of the major-league and independent teams that barnstormed through town in the early 20th century.

Pearch will shine a light on hometown talent like Odell's Bud Clancy (Chicago White Sox, Brooklyn Dodgers, Philadelphia Phillies), Wilmington's George Cutshaw (Brooklyn Dodgers, Pittsburgh Pirates, Detroit Tigers) and Dwight's Eddie Higgins (St. Louis Cardinal's) all of whom reached the major leagues. We will have baseball memorabilia including uniforms, team photos, tickets, and baseball cards from the era on display.






## Sneak Feak from the Upcoming German Immigration Exhibit

Goodfarm Township, north of Dwight, was settled by German immigrants beginning in 1851. John Racher and George S. Burger bought land that year and the following year George Simantel settled and purchased eighty acres. Before long many now-familiar Dwight names of German descent settled in this area: Krug, Burk, Burkhardt, Kepplinger, Gantzert, Hoffman, Zabel, and Pfeifer. (See Goodfarm Plat of 1870 on next page.)

Allen Gantzert, a member of the Historical Society, is the great-great grandson of one of the early German settlers in Goodfarm. Johann Philip Gantzert, wife Anna and family came to America from Elmhausen, Hesse, Germany, in the late 1840's. The family lived in New York City with Philip working as a tailor before moving to Goodfarm Township in 1855.

One of Philip's sons, John Henry, married Mary Pfeifer and they lived and farmed in Goodfarm



until his retirement. Together Henry and Mary had five children. Among their children was Elmer Gantzert, grandfather to Allen. John Henry died in 1918 and his obituary reported on his early beginnings in Goodfarm: "Mr. Gantzert had been a resident of Goodfarm and Dwight for 63 years and was a familiar figure to all. He came to Goodfarm township when only a child and when the country was raw prairie land. He was truly a pioneer of this vicinity and lived to see the country develop and our village grow from a handful of houses to the prosperous little city it is now."

The roots of Gantzerts in Goodfarm run deep. Allen is the fifth generation to farm and own land in Goodfarm. Allen follows his father Harvey, grandfather Elmer, great-grandfather John Henry, and great-great-grandfather Johann Philip.








Harvey Gantzert

# EE-YAH!

It was Good Enough for Anybody
If we did Get Beaten.

ABOUT 1500 PEOPLE SAW THE GAME AND WERE SATISFIED.

"Never in the history of Dwight, thanks to Col. F. Smith, has such a crowd witnessed a ball game as did last Tuesday afternoon. They not only came from Dwight, but Pontiac, Odell, Fairbury, Chenoa, Bloomington, Kankakee and from far and near, on the steam cars, the interurban, in automobiles, buggies, carriages, wagons, and some walked. It was a good natured crowd who came to see the Tigers eat up the Dwight boys, but while the Tigers did them up a little, they were surprised at the fact that they were not such an easy morsel to devour as they expected

The Tigers came in at 11 a.m. and were met at the train by a good bunch of local fans and escorted to the Livingston. They were taken about the city in automobiles and were well pleased, and when they left they agreed that they had never visited a nicer place or played before a finer crowd, or treated finer generally.

After the game in the evening they were tendered a reception and a ball, and the attendance was fine, and every attention paid the visitors."
